The 158th AVIATION BATTALICN (ASLT HEL) COAT of aRMS Granted 12 Har, 1969

DESCRIPTION

The distinctive insignia consists of the shield and motto of the Coat of Arms described as follows: A silver color metal and enamel shield and scroll 1-1/8 inches in height blazoned: Azure a case indented or, on the first a lightning flash point to base of the last and a winged sword of the second and for quillons a pair of wings saltirewise. Attached below the shield a silver color metal scroll inscribed "CHALLENGE" in black enamel letters.

SYMBOLISM

The sword represents the effective power of the Battalion's acrial weapons and the might of the organic fire support. The quillons (cross guard) composed of wings refer to the basic aviation mission of the unit. The eagle wings also allude to the Battalion's organic assignment to the lOlst Airborne Division. The speed and snock effect, characteristic of air assault operations, is indicated by the lightning flash. The peaks formed by the indented base refer to the mountainous area of Fort Carson Colorado where the organization was activated. The one sword blade, five-segmented hilt, and cross guard containing eight primary feathers allude to the numerical designation of the battalion.



MISSION

The mission of the 158th aviation Battalion (aSLT HEL) is twofold:

- 1. To provide tactical mobility for combat troops, supplies, and equipment of the 101st Aircorne Division (AMBL) during the conduct of compat and combat support operations.
- 2. To provide security for airmoble forces and to participate in offensive, defensive, and delaying actions as part of a highly mobile combined arms team.
